REFLECTING ON A YEAR OF LIFE

I enjoy the end of December for different reasons. There are, of course, the obvious times of holiday celebrations that fill the final days of December. It is wonderful to enjoy these days surrounded by friends and family. There are also the joys of looking forward to an entirely new year. Laura and I always have a date night shortly after the beginning of the new year where—in addition to going somewhere nice to eat—we talk about all the things we would like to do together that year and we make a yearly "To Do" list. Part of this process includes looking at the previous year's "To Do" list and seeing how successful we were in accomplishing our goals and whether or not our unfinished goals need to be carried over into the new year.

Psalm 8:3-4 says, "When I consider Your heavens, the work of Your fingers, the moon and the stars, which You have ordained, what is man that You are mindful of him, and the son of man that You visit him?" David said that he contemplated the mighty works of God's creation when he looked at the night sky. When he considered the awesome works of God, it humbled him that the Creator of the Universe would lovingly care for mankind. This contemplation moved David, humbled by the creative might and loving kindness of God, to write a psalm of praise to God which both begins and ends with these words: "O Lord, our Lord, how excellent is Your name in all the earth" (Psalm 8:1, 9). Notice the progression of the psalm: David saw the works of God, he then considered the magnitude of God's works, he was then humbled by God's greatness, and then from a heart of humility and awe he praised and worshiped his God. All of this happened because David paused to think.

It is always good for God's people to be reminded of the gracious works of God. It is also good for God's people to take inventory of their own activities. As the year 2018 winds down to a close, each of us should reflect on the year of life that God has blessed us with and consider three things: 1. How has God been at work in my life in 2018, 2. How well have I glorified God through my life in 2018, and 3. How can I better serve God in 2019? The following are a series of questions that will help us reflect on the year 2018:

Of the books of the Bible I read this year, which was my favorite and why?

Which Bible character do I most relate with this year?

What have I spent more time doing, asking for things from God or praising Him? Have I shared the Gospel with anyone this year?

Am I more able to engage in confession and repentance or pretending to be perfect? Who have I honored with my wealth, myself or the Lord (Prov. 3:9)?

What word would characterize my worship to God in 2018?

Let's use these questions to reflect on 2018 and then think about how we would like to answer them next year. As a church and as individuals, our goal should be to honor our God through everything we do. "Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works and glorify your Father in heaven" (Matthew 5:16).

TREE OF GRADUAL PROGRESS

Jesus was an incredible healer. His compassion for people and His divine power made Him the greatest physician the world has ever known. The collaboration of verses such as Matthew 4:23: "And Jesus went about all Galilee, teaching in their synagogues, preaching the gospel of the kingdom, and healing all kinds of sickness and all kinds of disease among the people," and the accounts of Jesus bringing deceased people back to life, gives the strong implication that there is not a physical ailment that could not be healed by the power of Jesus. This is not to say that Jesus did not employ different methods of healing people. In fact, He used quite a few different methods, including touching the person, speaking over the person, speaking about the person from afar, and having his clothing touched. Perhaps His most unusual method for healing was the use of spit. On only three occasions, God's word specifically records that Jesus used His saliva in the process of healing: in John 9:6 to make mud with which to anoint the eyes of a blind man, in Mark 7:33 to touch to the tongue of a deaf-mute man, and again in Mark 8:23 to heal a different blind man. This blind man of Mark 8 is the focus of our discussion today, because in addition to the interestingly rare use of spit we see in this account, we also see here the only time that Jesus did not immediately heal someone completely.

Once Jesus spit on this man's eyes, He asked him if he could see. The man replied, "I see men like trees, walking," (Mark 8:24, NKJV). Instead of being able to see clearly, the man's vision is rather blurry, and the people around have the appearance of trees. Jesus then touched the man's eyes a second time, and his vision was completely restored.

What might we learn from this rather peculiar account of Jesus healing a man gradually rather than immediately? The message here is that growth is not an instantaneous process. If encountering Jesus face-to-face requires additional time, additional faith, and additional compassion, then we can be sure that encountering Him through the word and through the church will require some additional things as well. All too often we limit the process of changing from a slave of sin to a courageous Christian, to the few minutes it takes to confess and be baptized. However, if we know it takes between 21 and 66 days (depending on who you ask) to break one habit or form a new one, imagine how long it must take to change one's entire character. Let us show some additional patience to

those who are just beginning their spiritual transformation. On the other hand, let those who have been undergoing their spiritual transformation for quite some time be wary of becoming content with "seeing trees." The process of spiritual growth is one that takes a lifetime, and I fear that too many of us become complacent with seeing trees, with incomplete growth, and we stop imploring Jesus to heal us further. May we all grant ourselves some additional motivation and diligence, that we may progress towards an ever-clearer outlook on life, and a deeper appreciation for our Savior
